From the year that Brought us Shoddywaddy,



#### Matters arising Update on Pond Lane parking issue

There has been a response on Fix my Street concerning the parking too close to the junction with Main Street. This cannot be enforced, so no further action will be taken.

Request for an ambulance bay with RCC Parking.

An initial assessment has been drafted by RCC Parking and is due to be discussed tomorrow (13<sup>th</sup> January) at the Highways and Transport Working Group. GPC will follow up with the Parking Services Manager after 13<sup>th</sup> January.

Update on 38 Main Street - derelict property

A letter has been passed to the owners of 38 Main Street from the residents of the neighbouring property. To date, no reply has been received.

RCC, together with Environmental Health have been asked to continue pursuing this.

Craig Howart at RCC is happy to have another look at this.

The neighbours next to 38 Main Street, thanked Cllr. Nick Begy for his time and effort in helping with this issue.

#### **Finance**

#### **Budget for 2022/23**

The Chair outlined the proposed budget for 2022/23.

It was noted that the GPC precept is historically very low compared with other villages of a similar size. All felt that the precept needs to be increased to give value to the Parish of Greetham, enabling the provision needed to react quickly to quarry issues.

An increase on the proposed budget for trees was suggested and discussed, together with other adjustments.

After further discussion, there was a vote on increasing the precept to £14,000 to cover biodiversity projects and the quarry.

#### **PLANNING**

# Planning Application 2021/0297/MIN – NW Extension to Greetham Quarry and Extension to RestorationTimeline on Existing Quarry NW Extension to Greetham Quarry:

There is no further update on the application for the NW extension as RCC are still in the period of collecting data on background dust and awaiting the results. GPC are lobbying hard for the dust monitoring to extended to cover a full 12 months in order that all seasonal variations are included. The seasonal variations could be due to farming activities – ploughing/harvesting, cleaning out of chicken sheds and variations in weather patterns, in order that the data, once analysed provides a very clear indication of how much particulate matter is already in the air prior to any further input from quarrying activities.

# Extension to Restoration Timeline and Discharge to S73 Planning Applications:

Mick George has provided RCC with some of the reports required from them under Discharge of Conditions pertaining to this application.

However, GPC believe these fall far short of the quality of dust and noise monitoring mitigation measures that should take effect during restoration and do not meet Government guidelines. Furthermore, Mick George have not provided a report on how they would remove the non-native invasive species from the site.

GPC had a meeting with Justin Johnson, Senior Planning Officer at RCC on 10<sup>th</sup> January to re-iterate concerns and push for enforcement of restoration to commence as soon as possible, to meet the deadline of end of September.

# Planning Application 2021/0170/MAO Housing & 2021/0171/MAO Warehousing

At the meeting with Justin Johnson on 10<sup>th</sup> January, GPC were told that the decision on the housing and warehousing applications should be coming to a conclusion within the next 2/3 months. This is dependent on the dust monitoring.

#### Planning Application 2021/1481/DIS

Proposal: Discharge of conditions 18 (noise), 25 (dust) and 38 (phasing plan for restoration works) of planning application 2020/0971/MIN S73 application for variation of condition 2 I relation to application reference number: M/1999/0326/09.

Amendment of Condition 2 to – "Unless otherwise agreed in writing with the Mineral Planning Authority this permission shall expire on 1<sup>st</sup> September 2022, by which time the site shall be fully restored in accordance with a scheme approved under Condition No. 26."

Greetham Quarry, Stretton Road, Greetham LE15 7NP

#### Planning Application 2021/1482/DIS

Proposal: Discharge of conditions 18 (noise), 25 (dust) and 38 (phasing plan for restoration works) of planning application 2020/0972/MIN S73 application for variation of condition in relation to application reference number: MIN/2004/1051. Change Condition 3 to – "Unless otherwise agreed in writing with the County Planning Authority mineral extraction shall cease and the site fully restored in accordance with a scheme approved under Condition no. 43 below and condition number 26 of planning permission 1999/0326/09 by 1<sup>st</sup> September 2022. Greetham Quarry, Stretton Road, Greetham LE15 7NP

#### Planning Application 2021/1458/MAF

Proposal: Section 73 (material amendment) to Planning Application 2020/1480/MAF – Erection of 60 leisure lodges for occupation on a non-continuous basis, renovation and conversion of existing barns to form a leisure suite including gym, swimming pool and ancillary spaces including staff accommodation, renovation and alteration of the existing Clubhouse, erection of a new maintenance facility, alterations to the grounds, including changes to the golf course and construction of lakes for leisure and ecological purposes, and ancillary works including alterations to the access drive, provision of a visitor check-in kiosk, alterations to car parking, creation of a circular walk, alteration and extension of the noise bund, and consequential landscape works.

Location: Woolfox Golf and Country Club, Hardwick Farm Lane, Empingham.

These are very minor changes on the last planning application. GPC had no comments.

#### **AGENDA ITEMS**

#### Consideration of the proposals for the Biodiversity Action Plan

DB presented the proposal for the Biodiversity Plan.

If approved, the Biodiversity plan will protect Greetham from industrial development.

The withdrawal of the draft Local Plan by RCC will present many challenges to the County in the 5 year period until any new plan is adopted. This is particularly so as the County Councils 5 year strategic 'housing need' programme has also expired. It is likely that many speculative housing and industrial development proposals will be submitted for consideration which, without the legal protection of a Local Plan, will have a considerable chance of success.

GPC need to ensure such proposals are acceptable to the needs of the County and the local area as best as possible.

The strongest means will be through the Neighbourhood Plan. In the period since the preparation of this Plan, much has changed and the Planning Focus Group consider it beneficial to undertake a detailed review in full consultation with the village.

As a part of this review, two proposals are recommended for consideration:

1. A detailed biodiversity action plan (this would provide a better understanding of the impacts of any proposed changes to the area to enable better protection of the localised habitat

It is vitally important that the project is properly managed to provide robust and meaningful understanding of the local biodiversity. Hence the need for suitably qualified consultants to undertake the work

2. Leading in part from the biodiversity action plan would be identifying areas of the village and its surround which the community feel important to protect and preserve from any adverse development.

It is hoped this would help ensure developers proposals are targeted away from such areas, thereby helping to afford some degree of protection.

3 quotes from consultants (fully qualified ecologists) have been obtained ranging from £20,000 to £4,300. It is recommended to appoint Ecology Resources to undertake the work at a cost of £4,335 excl. VAT.

#### **Focus Groups**

#### Fix my Street and Highways

The ambulance bay in Pond Lane is being addressed, and is likely to be closed off Fix my Street as the HTWG process with its timescales has kicked in.

A new report has been added regarding a cover removed near the sewage works entrance on the cycle path between Greetham and Cottesmore.

JD to add the issue raised under Ref 003/22 – concern of trees affecting vision to traffic from Exton Road.

#### **Trees, Nature and Environment**

Update on the planting of trees

The trees recently planted along the B668 from Greetham to Cottesmore will be maintained by RCC.

The hedge planting was referred to at Begy Gardens. Lovells had unlawfully removed the trees and then replanted inadequately, resulting in many trees/hedges dying.

It was questioned as to whether there are powers to enforce Lovells further, in conjunction with the Forestry Officer and Village Tree Warden to ensure this is done correctly.

#### **Burial Ground**

Maintenance work has been carried out on car park using white wine vinegar to clear the moss. The contractor did as requested, but has reported that this did not work satisfactorily. Agreed for AJ to look into other options.

The burial ground gates are due to be replaced out of this year's budget.
