

REVIEWS

Greetham WI Report, March 2016

Twenty four members attended the March meeting, with three apologies. Birthday posies were presented to Sue Bamber, Billie Hackett, Chris Parkin, Carol Fairbairn and Peggie Butcher. Our speaker, Mary Matts, lives in the house by the bottom lock at Foxton Locks and gave a fascinating talk on the plant life to be found along Britain's inland waterways. Her talk was illustrated by some beautifully photographed slides.

Mary has spent her whole life living on, or by canals. Traditionally, anything not actually poisonous was used for cooking or medicine. Many of our popular garden plants originally grew there, while many others have been lost because of overuse of pesticides. Half of Britain's original canal network now lies derelict, thus providing a perfect habitat for such plants to survive. Examples include daffodil bulbs (used as a narcotic), sloes (used to make ink as well as gin!) bluebells to make starch and periwinkle to staunch nosebleeds. Apart from what we would regard as wildflowers, the canal network was also home to trees and hedges (hawthorn hedges interspersed with elm trees were used to fence off the towpaths. Poplars planted beside the canal helped to combat pollution after the horses were replaced by engines in canal boats.

Following Mary's talk, Carol Fairbairn gave a report on the Annual Council Meeting of Leicestershire and Rutland WI held recently at Leicester Grammar School. Seven members from Greetham attended a most enjoyable day. The keynote speaker was the Rt. Hon Michael Portillo, who gave a most amusing speech about his life, political career and his second career as a television presenter. He also presented several trophies and certificates for events and competitions held throughout the county in 2015, including the Federation Quiz trophy, won by Greetham.

Next Month's meeting is Members' Night, when the committee take a well -earned rest and the members organise the evening.

GPC notes that the application refers to a planned extension which will be affected by the trees. Comment to be placed on RCC planning The Parish Council objects to this application until the application for the extension is received.

7 Parish Councillor recruitment

Statement of current situation:

The vacancy for Ward Member is currently advertised. RCC will call an election when required. Terry King represents Greetham as Ward Member until an appointment is made. The Parish Council vacancy advert closes on Monday. If no election is called the PC will coopt a new member. In this event all Councillors are asked to provide details of anyone interested to the Clerk, who will issue invitations to attend the April meeting. Following presentations/ questions voting will occur. This can be done by secret ballot after proposal and seconding has taken place.

8 Discussion of Double Yellow Lines in Main Street

Discussion followed the statement that the placing of double yellow lines in Main Street from Great Lane to The Black Horse (on both sides) would enhance safety for vehicles exiting Great Lane and Little Lane.

It was noted that some residents would have no alternative parking provision and that urbanisation of the village is an issue.

If placing of double yellow lines is submitted as a proposal it will be included in a future agenda.

9 Parish Plan Focus Group Reports

Traffic focus group update.

Feedback from meeting with Neil Tomlinson

Double yellow lines are not in accordance with Rutland policy. Implementation would require support from the Ward Member, the PC and the Portfolio Holder before submission to Cabinet. Enforcement is doubtful.

Removal of the speed table in Great Lane. Plans are to initially dig a relief water soakaway. If unsuccessful 'shaving' could then be considered.

Lessening HGV traffic. In order to implement this the PC would need to prove the increase in HGV traffic through Greetham is greater than the national average. Any property damage caused by vibration would have to be proved. Viable alternatives would have to be presented and support of the Road Haulage Association achieved. Action: Traffic Focus Group to submit a proposal to the April meeting to carry this forward.

Wider footpaths. The areas of concern are at the pinch point near The Black Horse and by the shop/ Oak House. Implementation of temporary width restriction at both points would allow the gathering of information regarding road noise and benefits achieved. Also a temporary 'right of way' for traffic travelling east at the pinch point could be trialled.

Lead in time for this is 2-3 years. Action: Traffic Focus Group to submit this as a proposal to the April meeting.

20 mph. Research is currently being conducted into reprogramming the speed indicator near Church Lane. This could provide support for moving the start of the 20mph limit to the west.

Great Lane farm access. A site visit indicated that road markings/ hatchings could be investigated though these are not enforceable as no parking zones. Action: Traffic focus group to submit this as a consultation process to the April agenda.

RCC are investigating the possibility of renaming the section of the B668 from Cottesmore to Greetham in memory of Roger Begy.

Tree Focus Group update:

Suggestions were outlined for placing of trees include alongside the B668, Great Lane, the Community Centre field and the Burial Ground. Grants for funding need to be submitted by the end of March. These include CORY but other grant providers are being investigated. Costings have been obtained. The Tree Focus Group will prioritise the B668 and Great Lane initially.

Bench Focus Group update.

An audit of existing benches has been undertaken and the need for maintenance established. This will be raised as a finance item on the April agenda.

The establishment of an Energy Focus Group is suggested. Interest in involvement will be sought in advance of the April meeting.

10 Community Centre Update

Finance, letting and bar reports given.

Forthcoming events include The Comedy Evening and Summer Ball.

Plans to refurbish the kitchen are being prepared.

Ideas submitted for use of the field include a putting green / crazy golf and cycle track.


