Developing Resilience

Each term we focus on an 'R' of learning. Our 'R' for this term is learning to be resilient.

Everyone finds something tricky at some point in their lives. We have a choice: to give up, or to keep trying. It is when we keep trying that we are truly learning. Some



famous people would not be so well known today if they had given up at the first hurdle: athletes such as basketball player Michael Jordan, who was cut from his school basketball team; Walt Disney was sacked from his first newspaper job for having 'no imagination and no original ideas'; and even the Beatles were turned down by a record company!

We asked the children what they thought it meant to be resilient. They have some great ideas! Most of the children used words like 'you have to keep going'; 'it is never giving up' and 'you have to persevere when it gets tricky'.

We teach the children that to 'FAIL' is good. This stands for 'First Attempt In Learning'. If we can just keep going and try again, trying different ways and different methods, and then practise these new skills, we can soon become experts in whatever we want to achieve.
