Greetham Women's' Institute Report of meeting held on Monday Jan 8th 2018

Twenty-two members were present for the first meeting of 2018. Birthday posies were presented to Pat Kenworthy, Cathy Dyson, and Alison Kirby. Our speaker was Adrian Walker, a fund Raiser for LOROS (the Hospice for Leicestershire and Rutland). Adrian has raised over £150,000 for the Hospice, mostly by undertaking guided walks along the coast to coast route (St. Bees to Robin Hoods Bay). He was accompanied by Debbie Illingworth who brought along a selection of merchandise to sell on behalf of the Hospice. The first section of the climb seems to be the most taxing, involving the Fells of the lake District, Lancashire and the Yorkshire Dales. Just when the walkers think the worst is over, they are faced with the steepest climb of the whole trek which is in the North Yorkshire Moors.

Neighbourhood Watch

The following advice has been sent out by the National Fraud and Cyber Crime Reporting Centre.

Better internet security in two minutes

Domain Name Systems (DNS) are like public phone books for the web. They're the reason you only need to remember a website's name and not its IP address (think of these as phone numbers for computers). When you type "www.youtube.com" into a browser, a DNS service translates that into the associated IP address (199.223.232.0) for you. Imagine a phone book that automatically filters and removes phone numbers known to be used for fraud. That's what Quad9 does for websites. Quad9 provides an automated way to protect yourself and your business by blocking access to known malicious websites, like phishing sites designed to steal personal or banking details.

Quad9 checks the website to determine if it's malicious.

Visit <u>Quad9.net</u> for a step-by-step guide on how to improve your online security in two minutes.

Fake NatWest text messages appearing in message threads – We have received reports about fraudsters sending out a range of messages purporting to be from NatWest that lead to websites harvesting personal banking information.

Fraudsters are using specialist software which alters the sender ID on the message so that it appears as if it's come from NatWest, adding it to any existing message threads on the recipient's phone.

If you already bank with NatWest and had a legitimate message from them in the past this could easily catch you out. It seems to be targeting individuals regardless of whether they are customers of NatWest or not.

If you click on the link you'll be taken to an exact replica of the NatWest website that asks for sensitive personal information including full name, address, contact details, PIN and debit card numbers.

Tree Warden's report

Some of you may know that a copse at the rear of Northbrook Close was removed on December 12^{th l} last year. Several months before this, residents of Greetham Square, and the Tree Warden had severally contacted the Rutland County Council to seek advice on the status of the trees as there was concern about their possible removal. —no re-

plies were forthcoming.

In spite of calls to the County Council on December 12th from residents, the on-site appeals from the Chairman of the Parish Council and a visit from the RCC Forestry Officer, the felling continued.

A Forestry Commissioner was contacted and quickly arrived able to visit the site and halt further felling. The County Council has now placed Tree Preservation Orders on the remaining trees. The Commissioner intends to use appropriate powers to seek the replanting of trees in that area.


