

## WI Report June 2016

June is traditionally the month of our summer outing, so June 13<sup>th</sup> saw a coachload of members, partners and friends set of from Greetham at 9.30 on a rainy Monday morning. Our destination was The National Memorial Arboretum, near Lichfield in Staffordshire. Our journey was slightly delayed in the aftermath of an incident which closed the M1 for several hours, so most people headed straight for the coffee bar on arrival. The Arboretum, which opened in 2001 is currently undergoing some refurbishment, including the building of a new Visitor Centre and Cafeteria. The main military memorial is also being refurbished, but a small replica has been erected, which contains the names of all servicemen and women killed in conflicts since the end of the Second Wold War.

The Arboretum is not just for Military use----it contains memorials for organisations such as the Stillbirth and Neonatal Death Society and the WI. The site covers fifteen acres and is beautifully landscaped. After fifteen years, the original trees are maturing, while further planting continues. An act of Remembrance takes place in the chapel at 11am every day. A small land train with a running commentary tours the site at half hourly intervals---a welcome respite! Many of the Memorials are beautiful works of art—my particular favourites are the RAF memorial (a huge silver eagle on top of a globe) and the new glass memorial to the Atlantic Convoys of WW2. Several members went to an informative talk in the Chapel, which is made entirely of wood, including the whole trunks of four Douglas Firs, with just the bark stripped off. Other interesting areas include a museum telling the harrowing stories of some of the WW2 Far East Prisoners. The shop sells tasteful souvenirs and books.

The Arboretum is built on the site of a disused quarry and there is still plenty of room for extension. The Project has been funded by the Quarry Owners, the Royal British Legion, Staffordshire County Council, and many private donors. It is a very pleasant and peaceful place to visit, and when the new visitor centre is finished it will be a suitable place for a family outing, with plenty of activities planned for children.

### Tree Warden News

I have been successful in my application for a grant through Cory Environmental Trust in Rutland of £6.000 for the planting of trees on the Viking Way within the gated area of Great Lane. After consultation with many tree experts including the forestry officer for our county council along with on-site visits, it was considered that well planted native trees, with a diverse range for flower, summer and autumn colour and structural

canopies would enhance this area of The Viking Way which is much used by villagers and visitors alike. Should the cost of planting be less than the grant then extra trees will be planted along the B668 to continue the line of trees which were planted in 2015.

I am meeting with the Rutland County Council Forestry Officer soon to discuss the planting which should take place in the late autumn. I would be happy to receive any ideas for species of trees to be considered. Peter Hitchcox Tree Warden
