WI Report, February 2015

Twenty one members and one guest attended the February meeting on a very wintry evening. Apologies were received from Alison Gossel, Estelle Allan, Chris Parkin, Jessie Evison, Sue Bamber and Ann Gorman. Birthday posies were presented to Gill Hodson, Diana Miller and Linda Hall.

Our Speaker was Greetham girl Jenny Welbourne (née Creasey) of Itch Gallery in Mill Street, Oakham. Jenny told us how she had come to be the owner of the gallery and shared some of the secrets of her trade with us. She studied Applied Art at De Montfort University, Leicester. The first year of the course was an access year, with a chance to try her hand at everything (she particularly disliked ceramics). The second year involved

more specialised studies in certain areas, and in her final year she specialised in blown glass, with some ceramics in the final term. After graduation Jenny chose to stay on as an artist-in –residence and mentor to other students. She was also selected to receive a year's support on mentoring in business.

On leaving university Jenny started work as a self-employed ceramicist, and subsequently worked in the Ferrers Gallery in Ashby de la Zouch. While working there she picked up many tips about peoples' likes and dislikes from listening to customers. Itch Gallery in Oakham was set up in 2010 by Cath Pilling. Jenny covered her maternity leave and was subsequently offered the chance to buy the gallery. De Montfort University helped her write her business plan and the bank was very supportive. Having taken over, Jenny wanted to put her own stamp on the Gallery (Itch more stocks craft items, as well as Fine Art). Jenny finds the things she loves sell the best! By 2014 she was keen to introduce workshops and so looked for bigger premises. The new premises in Mill St are four times as large as the previous gallery, and extend to two floors. This has given Jenny the scope to include furniture and larger sculptures. Workshops are held twice monthly on crafts such as jewellery, lampshades and ceramics. Jenny's artists are all British producing good quality handmade work. She produces postcards with examples of her artists' work and has a website for retail as well as the Gallery. (itchgallery.co.uk) Jenny took questions from members after her talk, and a vote of thanks was given by Carol Freeman. The talk was followed by refreshments served by Pat Evans and Billie Hackett.

Our next meeting will be Members' Evening, when the committee have a well earned rest from organising the activities. This will take place in the community centre on March 9th at 7.45pm

LOOK AFTER YOUR CAT

Theft of Catalytic Converter from motor vehicles

The theft of Catalytic Converters is on the rise in Rutland and neighbouring counties. The latest two incidents occurred overnight Mon 16th – Tues 17th Feb 15 in Edith Weston where one catalytic converter was stolen from a vehicle and an attempt was made to steal a converter from a second vehicle.

Crime Prevention

4x4 vehicles in particular have been targeted as the catalytic convertor is more readily accessible. To reduce the risk of theft of your car's catalytic convertor;

- · Garage your car whenever possible
- · Park in busy well-lit areas
- · Look out for people working under cars
- · Consider purchasing an after market device to secure your convertor, such as a cage or lock.
- · If the car is a high risk, such as a 4x4, consider marking the shell of the convertor with a unique mark, so that if it is removed by thieves it will be easier to trace back to your vehicle a small number of Catalytic convertor security marking kits are available from Oakham Police Station for £5.00.
- · If you see something suspicious ring the police immediately on 101 or 999 in an emergency Anyone with information regarding the theft of catalytic convertors is urged to call Leicestershire Police on 101* or Crimestoppers, which is free** and anonymous, on 0800 555 111. * Calls to 101 cost 15p for the entire call from both mobile phones and land lines ** Please note some mobile phone service providers may charge for this call Rutland Police






